Leo Jodoin, W1TNE, received his "General" license and Walter T. Schneider, W1ZJQ, received the 3rd Class Commercial certificate. GUD fur ya, boys, and congratulations.

Special ARRL Bulletin (referring to Propagation).
It should be emphasized that rising sunspot activity also brings periods of high absorption on the lower Amateur frequencies, especially on East-West paths traversing the higher latitudes. Auroral propagation is likely on 28, 50, and 144 MHz. at such times, particularly in the Northern areas of the United States and adjacent Canada. This develops most often in the early Evening hours of days when WWV index is "4" or higher.

ATTENTION---OSCAR TRACKERS. Due to High Battery Temperature, Oscar 7 will be in Mode B. Educational Mode A days will be maintained if possible. Monitor W1AW or Oscar 7 cedestore for schedule changes.

The FCC announced Feb. 13, 1978 that it is permitting Licensed Amateur Radio Operators to operate their primary stations as repeater, auxiliary link, control, and remotely controlled stations without prior FCC approval. Primary stations operating in the Repeater Mode must identify by following their call sign with RPT/Repeater, primary stations operating in the auxiliary link mode must identify by following their call with AUX/Auxiliary, depending on the mode used. There are no special identification requirements required for primary stations operating in the control or remotely controlled modes. This waiver is Effective Immediately and will terminate when FCC releases a further order impertaining to this matter.

LAST MINUTE NEWS from ARRL Headquarters--With the coming of the Travel Season United States and Canada Amateurs will be taking advantage of Reciprocal Operating Agreements. For amateurs who are planning to travel in Canada from the United States, and vice versa, the current procedure to be followed is to request specific application forms from ARRL. Since a minimum of 45 days is required to process the forms, after the traveler has returned them to ARRL, you are urged to request Reciprocal Operating Permission Forms through the International Services Officer, ARRL Headquarters, as soon as possible.
