MEMBERSHIP BANS SMOKING DURING MEETINGS

During the March business meeting, a motion to *ban smoking during meetings* was placed on the floor for consideration. The discussion was intense.

Ken Raposa, K1NSX, (guest lecturer) presented a great Tech-Talk on *Operational Amplifiers* on March 19th at the SEMARA clubhouse.

Attendees were given a booklet and a 3.5" disc with information on operational amplifiers. The booklet contained the exact material that Ken presented during the lecture using an overhead projector. This made note taking a breeze!

Ken explained basic operational amplifier operation and outlined typical circuits they are used in. The presentation was well received.

LITTLE LEO UPDATE

The Little Leo satellite industry now wants the 220 MHz band in addition to the 2 meter and 440 bands! This latest assault on amateur radio came to light on February 13th at a meeting of FCC Informal Working Group 2A. The ARRL and AMSAT filed immediate objections to this new threat to our ham bands.



The actual fate of our amateur radio bands will be determined during the 1997 World Radiocommunication Conference. Hopefully, the objections voiced by the ARRL, AMSAT, and the general public will derail the FCC from presenting the Little Leo proposal at the conference.

FCC DECLARES ALL CELLULAR MODIFICATIONS ILLEGAL

In mid February, the FCC issued a public notice declaring illegal any modification made to any receiver that permits reception of cellular calls. The FCC made it crystal clear that it is also illegal for manufacturers and dealers to modify radios for cellular reception.

This decision came as members of congress raised concerns over the illegal taping and subsequent publication in the New York Times of a cellular call during which House Speaker Newt Gingrich spoke.



FCC LEVIES \$20,000 FINE IN CELLULAR SCANNER CASE

The FCC fined Ace Communications of Fishers, Indiana, \$20,000 for illegally selling scanners that could receive cellular phone calls. The FCC cited willful and repeated violations of various sections of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, as justification for the fine. Ace Communications is expected to appeal the decision.

A FISH STORY

Several fishermen in Southern California took the bait when someone sold them amateur radios programmed on the input frequency of the 146.82 repeater in the Los Angeles area. The repeater monitors realized that the fishermen didn't want others listening to their conversations since they were discussing where the fishing was good.



That was the key to stopping the transmissions. The monitors alerted the fishermen that their broadcasts were being relayed over a repeater and that everyone was listening to their private conversations. The fishermen ceased transmitting immediately!

NEW FCC PHONE NUMBER FOR LICENSE INFORMATION

The FCC has announced that a new toll-free number is now available for inquiries concerning new licenses and vanity call changes. The new number is 888-225-5322. This number will connect callers directly with the FCC National Call Center, which is part of the FCC's Consumer Information Bureau. Callers to the old Consumer Information number will get a recording referring them to the new number.

BIG HAM FAMILY

Len Umina, N1LU, feels he may head the largest amateur family under one roof in the world! Len has been a ham for 30 years and resides in Marlboro, MA. Len managed to get his whole family interested in amateur radio, and get them licensed within a ten week period. Besides Len and his wife Vicki, N1XYA, there are Suzanne, N1YFT; Laura, N1YGB; Kristina, N1YCG; Anthony, N1YHL; and David, N1YHO.

His children range in age from 7 to 16. Len used that fact to his advantage. He made the challenge to his family that if they all got an amateur radio license, he would take them to Disney World (some would call it bribery). Talk about motivation! Fact is, not only does Len possibly have the largest amateur radio family under one roof, but they may hold the record for how fast they did it.

CHRISTIE'S TO AUCTION GUGLIELMO MARCONI MEMORABILIA

Christie's of London expects to realize \$1.6 million from the sale of rare memorabilia from the collection of Guglielmo Marconi. The two-day sale will be held April 24 and 25 at their South Kensington auction house.

Among the items offered is Marconi's 1896 first patent for "Improvements in Wireless Telegraphy".

Proceeds of the sale will sponsor "Marconi Days", an educational incentive to train 1,000 electronics teachers a year. The sale is sponsored by GEC-Marconi as part of its Marconi centenary celebration.

BELL ATLANTIC NYNEX MOBILE CELLULAR TOWER UPDATE



ormal negotiations with Bell Atlantic NYNEX Mobile commenced at 9 AM on February 27, 1997 in the SEMARA clubhouse at 54 Donald Street in South Dartmouth, MA. The association's representatives were William Miller (Chairman), Lawrence Houbre, and Scott Szala. Bell Atlantic NYNEX Mobile was represented by Scott Cohen, Manager of Real Estate (Woburn, MA), and Steven Bozkurtian, Principle of Structure Appraisal Group (Belmont, MA).

Following introductions, Chairman Miller handed the NYNEX representatives copies of a newspaper article outlining the recent denial of a variance by the Dartmouth Zoning Board for a cellular tower site behind Gifford Marine on Dartmouth Street. Scott Cohen of NYNEX then outlined the process of installing a cellular tower site from beginning to end.

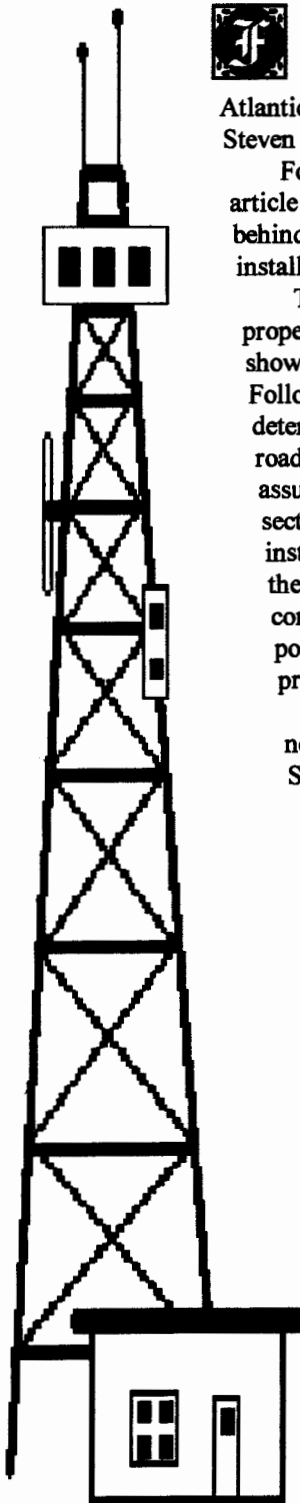
The first step towards installing a cellular tower site is to have the property surveyed. This survey also includes the preparation of a plot plan showing all buildings, roads, open space, trees, etc. on the property. Following the survey, a civil engineer meets with the property owner to determine where on the property the tower is best located. Next, a gravel road is installed to permit access to the cellular site by heavy trucks. This assures that there will be no problems with the delivery of the steel tower sections and the prefabricated reinforced concrete buildings that will be installed on the site. Then, test borings are taken to determine the size of the concrete base required to support the self-standing tower. Main construction then commences with the installation of the tower, buildings, power and telephone feeds, fencing, etc.. Barring any unforeseen problems, the whole job is completed in about three to four months.

Next, Chairman Miller went down a list of 16 items of concern prepared by the club's negotiating committee. (A review meeting was held just prior to the main meeting with NYNEX.) Some of the items discussed included:

- **Real estate tax obligations.** NYNEX will pay taxes on their leased land, and possibly our taxes if they are impacted by NYNEX leasing from us - slated for more discussion.
- **Power and phone lines to be underground (safety and freedom from RFI).** NYNEX agreed.
- **One million dollars in general liability insurance to be kept in force for the life of the lease.** NYNEX agreed.
- **NYNEX to plow access road.** NYNEX agreed.
- **All future tenants on the tower must cease operations and take corrective action at their expense if RFI problems arise.** NYNEX agreed.
- **At the end of the lease and any extensions, SEMARA shall have the option of assuming ownership of the tower and buildings or having them removed at NYNEX's expense.** NYNEX agreed.

Several items remain to be negotiated. At this point in time, NYNEX is preparing the first draft of a lease for our review and comment. Also forthcoming from NYNEX is a monthly payment offer, and the results of their RF survey recently performed from our site.

Please attend the April business meeting for the next update on the committee's progress. It is anticipated that the committee will meet again before the next business meeting and have more information to share with the membership.

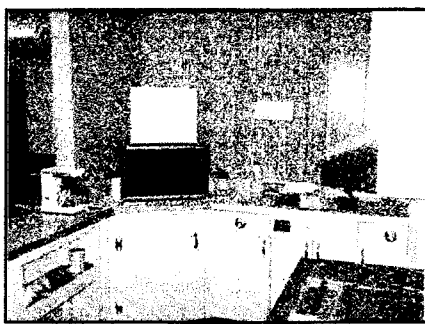

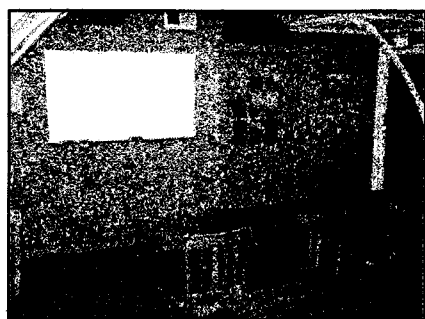
SITUATED ON THREE ACRES OF LAND IN SOUTH DARTMOUTH, MA

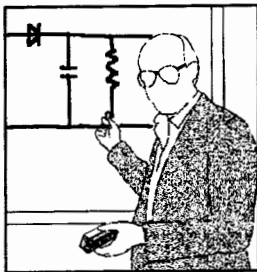
