ACON SECTION

BALLOON WITH 2METER BEACON TO BE LAUNCHED FROM PLYMOUTH

s part of an earth science project being conducted at the Plymouth Community Intermediate School, a 2 meter beacon will be aboard a balloon launched from Plymouth, MA. The launch is scheduled for 3:00 PM on Tuesday, December 2nd. The launch will rescheduled if adverse weather conditions preclude a safe launch.

The 100 mw beacon will be transmitting on 144.000600 MHz with a CW ID and short periods of steady carrier to aid tracking. If you are interested in tracking this balloon, please contact Hank Riley, N1LTV, at:

Hank points out that CW or SSB receiving equipment is best suited for beacon tracking. Such equipment will acquire the balloon at a low altitude and track it for the greatest distance. FM equipment can also be used, but at a great sacrifice in sensitivity. To compound the problem, FM receivers make copying the CW ID very difficult.

NEW FORM 610 MANDATORY IN 1998

The FCC has announced that effective January 1, 1998, a new form 610 will be required of all amateur radio license applications.

Until January 1, 1998 both the new and old form may be used, but after January 1, 1998 the new form is mandatory.

The new Form 610 is available off the Internet at two sites:

The major change on the new form is a certification section where the applicant must state that he has "read and will comply with section 97.13(c) of the Commission's Rules" regarding RF radiation safety and the amateur service section of OST/OET Bulletin No 65 "Evaluating Compliance with FCC-Specified Guidelines for Human Exposure to Radio Frequency Electromagnetic Fields".

However, at the present time Amateur Radio Supplement B of Bulletin 65 is still in the draft stages and is not yet available to the amateur community. This supplement has information on how to conduct a routine RF safety evaluation in addition to explaining other aspects of RF safety. It is expected that the supplement will be released by December 1997.

Section 97.13(c) states that before amateurs transmit "from any place where the operation of the station could cause human exposure to RF electromagnetic fields in excess of those allowed" you have to perform a routine RF environmental evaluation if your transmitter PEP exceeds these limits:

AMATEUR RF LIMITS

160 thru 40 meters - 500 watts

30 meters - 425 watts

20 meters - 225 watts

17 meters - 125 watts

15 meters - 100 watts

12 meters - 75 watts

10 meters - 50 watts

VHF (all bands) - 50 watts

70 cm - 70 watts

33 cm - 150 watts

23 cm - 200 watts

13 cm - 250 watts

SHF/EHF (all bands) - 250 watts

If a routine environmental evaluation indicates that the RF electromagnetic fields could exceed the maximum permissible exposure limits, you must take action to prevent human exposure.





ARRL ANNOUNCES "RADIO COACHES" PROGRAM

In an effort to introduce the youth of our Nation to amateur radio, the ARRL has instituted the "Radio Coaches" program. The goal is to expose thousands of youngsters to the exciting world of amateur radio.

The program starts at the local club level with ARRL affiliated clubs forming "coaching teams". The teams in turn will build relationships with a local school or other institution from which the "athletes" will be recruited.

The "athletes" in turn will be coached in basic electronics and amateur radio. Field trips to museums, hamfests, radio/TV stations, airports,




and radio conventions may be part of the "coaching" experience.

Hopefully, the "athletes" will not only become amateur radio operators, but also gain a marketable skill in electronics which will benefit them throughout their life.

FCC SETS RF LEVEL FOR REPEATERS

The FCC has released an erratum to its RF safety rules that sets 500 watts ERP as the limit for most amateur repeaters before a routine RF safety evaluation must be conducted. The erratum applies to repeater systems on



all amateur bands.

However, a routine RF safety evaluation is mandated for all repeater systems running over 500 watts ERP and having either (1) a building mounted antenna or (2) a non-building mounted antenna with a height of less than 10 meters (about 33 feet) above ground level to the lowest point of the antenna.

ARRL CLUB SURVEY RESULTS ANNOUNCED

uring 1997, almost 700 clubs completed an ARRL survey. Overall the survey indicated that many clubs are not aware of the specific, tangible benefits ARRL affiliation offers.

Interestingly, over 65% of all affiliated clubs have been in existence over 20 years, 30% have been in existence over 40 years, and 10% over 60 years.

The survey indicated that major sources of income for clubs in clude: (87%), donations (48%), hamfests (32%), raffles (20%), and other (8%).



Three-quarters of all clubs publish a newsletter, and 64% send a copy to ARRL representatives. Additionally, 25% of all clubs have a home-page on the World Wide Web (WWW).

The ARRL can now chart its future direction using the valuable feedback provided by the club survey.

FCC INITIATES UNIVERSAL LICENSING SYSTEM

The FCC is implementing its new Universal Licensing System (ULS). The new system will ultimately replace the 11 different systems now in use. Ultimately, the ULS will allow hams (and others) to make on-line license updates and renewals. The new system also lets you check on the status of a pending application. This will eliminate the need for hardcopy forms like the venerable Form 610.

In an effort to populate the new database, the FCC is asking licensees to register with the new system. You will be required to supply your Taxpayer Identification Number



(TIN - for individuals this is your Social Security Number) and your individual call sign along with any club station calls for which you are the trustee.

When registering, you will provide your name and address along with a password you must use along with your TIN to re-enter the system to make future changes.

Licensees without access to the Internet can register using FCC Form 60, which is available from the FCC's fax-on-demand service at 202-418-0177, or by calling the FCC Forms Distribution Center at 1-800-418-3676.



SOLDERING TECHNICAL TIPS

- 1.) Water bottles, like those used by bikers and hikers, are great for holding water to wet your soldering sponge.
- 2.) Plastic trays, like those used to organize desks, make nifty holders for your soldering items various sizes of solder, solder wick, small wire brush, Q-tips, small bottle of flux remover, etc.
- 3.) A wooden block with two spring-type clothes pins screwed onto it (about two inches apart) makes a super holder for those tough to solder items such as small connectors and wires.


