




For the good of the club - Photo album on big table in club should be reviewed by all members and any information recorded as noted on the first page of the album.




CLUB NOTES

Perhaps ham radio has lost its thrill for you over the years. Has it become same-old, same-old? Recall then the excitement of making your first novice contacts. Like most of us, you probably used a bit of military surplus, a Heathkit, or even a homebrew rig that you built yourself. Perhaps you made an antenna that was little more than whatever scrap of wire was in the basement or garage. And boy didn't we have fun! Well folks, I am here to tell you, the thrill is back, and it's called QRP.

Imagine a HF radio station that you can carry in a lunch box. Some QRP rigs really are small enough to do this. And when I say station, I mean the WHOLE station - radio, paddle, antenna and power supply (you may even be able to squeeze a sandwich in too.)

Now please don't get the idea that these small radios are small on performance. Many have receivers that are the equal of the best Yaecomwood rigs. They do have, however, much smaller and much less power hungry transmitters, so power requirements are minimal. This makes them very portable. One of my radios operates on a pack of 8 AA NiMH batteries. They provide about 10 hours service at 3.5 watts output with typical 80% receive / 20% transmit duty cycle.

You might justifiably ask then "How far am I going to get with a tiny 5 watt or less signal?" You would be very surprised. The secret is using CW as the mode of choice. CW has about a 12db advantage over SSB.

easy to copy as an 80 watt SSB signal over the same path. It is likely that your current sideband rig puts out around 100 watts maximum. (The difference between 80 and 100 watts is less than ½ of an s-unit.) So you will be about as effective with 5 watts CW as you currently are running SSB at your rig's full power. It is not unusual at all for me to get 569 to 599 signal reports from the US west coast and Europe running just 5 watts.

That means that a 5 watt CW signal is about as

Hopefully, this has lit a small spark in some of you folks. Maybe given some of you ideas about how you can operate HF from anywhere - perhaps from a vacation spot, a hotel room on a business trip, on a picnic, or even in your own back yard on a nice warm summer day. The only thing left to do is select the rig that suits your needs and wallet, and warm up your soldering iron - if you have the inclination to delve into a homebrew project. You may even try to remember where you buried your key in your yard the day after you got your General license.



TECHNICAL TIPS

Copper water pipe (heavy walled) makes a great ground bus for your station. Use a section of 1" pipe for low in-When buying the ductance. pipe be sure to get several copper pipe mounting jigs. Use them to mount the pipe on the wall or on the rear of the desk in the radio room. Copper ground wires from your equipment can be secured to the pipe with copper bolts and nuts. Flatten one end of the pipe in a large vise, and attach wide tinned copper braid to the pipe with two or more bolts and nuts. Run the braid to a good ground rod or as an alternate to a cold water pipe. Make the pipe the single point for all grounds in your station.
