





Behind the Call Sign

Walking up to the large house in the historic district of downtown New Bedford, I noticed the detail of this 1822 circa home in a way that I had never before, even though I've passed by it so many times in my lifetime. It truly must have been beautiful in its heyday, and the current owner seems to be concerned with keeping it in decent repair within the historical commission guidelines.



This becomes the beginning of Jim's dilemma, and how he solved it. He lives on the second floor of this old building with few amenities. His whole adobe is in one room with one electrical outlet on the 'wrong' side of the room. The room measures about 13 by 13 feet. This room is where our story will end.

I im lived in the north end of the city when he first I heard about amateur radio around 1954. He soon discovered that a neighbor up the street had some antennas out, and his curiosity about radio got to him. So he knocked at the door and met Henry, W1YEG. He and Henry struck up a conversation about radio and didn't take too long to become fast friends, with Henry teaching him what he needed to know about radio theory and Morse Code to obtain his own novice call. He proudly became W1HQL, and started his own projects. He got his first station together, a Viking-2 and an NC98 transmitter, with a wire antenna strung up in the yard. That started his career in ham radio. While in Europe in 1959, he let his call drop. In 1975, he passed the general license exam and got WB1AQX as his call. He kept it until he changed it recently to a vanity call, dropping the "B."

He also pursued a music career which became successful. It send him to all parts of the world for many years until he found himself in Las Vegas, where he worked the lounges and also worked for the casinos in machine maintenance. He was in Vegas for about 10 years before he left and returned to New Bedford. This is where we find Jim now. We will continue with the story of his unusual surroundings.




SEPARATE 10-, 15-, AND 20-M ANTENNAS

Jim had sold all his radios in the west and came home with an Alinco 2 meter radio that he used cross country. About a year after arriving back home, he moved into his present room which is now about 5 years. He soon started to get the urge for some HF radios and went about acquiring some.

The landlord allows no outside wires, no cable wires, and nothing hanging or defacing the building. This meant that, if he wanted to transmit, he had to have antennas strung inside. He tried many configurations and finally settled on his present antenna configuration: three separate Isotron antennas, for 10-, 15-, 20-meters, mounted on top of a 9-foot TV mast in the corner of the shack area. He acquired another Isotron antenna to operate on 75-and 80-meters.

He can transmit at 100 watts output without any RFI problems in his shack. He observes quiet hours when the business offices downstairs are open. (The whole building has old two-wire wiring and has not been upgraded.) He checks in on many nets and has many friends all over the US and Europe.

The object was to make CW contact with as many FISTS members as possible from 1700 to 2100 UTC on July 10, 2004. We had great band conditions. 20-meters was red hot! 39 of our QSOs were on 20-meters and 7 QSOs on 40-meters. This gave us 230 QSO points. We worked 21 states, for a final score of 4,830 points. In the FISTS Spring Sprint we got 2,945 points.


