

September Lighthouse Activity



LOVELL'S ISLAND AND THE NARROWS

The Solar Flux Index was 67. About as low as it can go and the predicted temperature was for the mid 90's. Traffic was light for the one hour drive to Hull. We arrived at Fort Revere right at our scheduled time and were on the air just about on schedule.

As usual we started on 80 meters. Whitey only made 4 contacts. But 3 of those were ARLHS members so that made it worthwhile.

Then, changing our normal game plan, we went to 20 meters SSB. Pickings were rare and Whitey only got 9 contacts; of these 9, 4 were West German DX.

From there I went to 20 CW where I was pleasantly surprised to have a pipe line to Western Europe and work 5 DX including Germany, Poland, Scotland, Croatia and Slovenia. I ended up with 11 QSOs. Then we went to 40 SSB where Whitey had a pretty good run. From there it was 40 CW where I only got 4 contacts then back to 40 SSB where

Whitey had another good run.

We then tried 20 CW and I had another nice run of 11 QSOs and added 4 more countries working England, Scotland, Italy and Bulgaria.

At one point both 20 and 40 died out, so we decided to try 30 meters CW. We set up on the QRP frequency and I managed 4 QSOs. These were a real challenge as two of them were QRP. One running 3 watts and the other 5 watts. The next contact must have been running a KW in to a monobander; he just about blew my eardrums out because I had the audio gain turned way up for QRP stations!

All and all, a pretty good day considering conditions. North-South propagation was not as good as normal and we only worked 5 Canadians.

That repeater usage will be under-going a significant change in our area. With the *PAVE PAWS* situation, some of the local 440 repeater have been asked to reduce their power output by 50 dB or more.

That's a reduction by a factor of 10^5 or 100,000. A 100 Watt repeater would now be limited to 1 milliwatt! One station was asked to reduce by 56 dB; that's 250 microwatts or less, depending what their starting output power was!

Is it any wonder that you won't be hearing too much 440 activity near Otis Air Force base? That's why I replaced the repeater directory for 440 with one for 222. The list for 440 was last updated on September 15; but still had some repeaters not listed as OFF, like Falmouth. So, you are advised to check <http://www.nerepeaters.com/se.htm#440> regularly to see who is still operating on the band.

Congratulations to the new officers. Welcome to **Rick, W1RJ** as Secretary and the two new Trustees, **Mike, N1ITQ** and **Charlie, WA1JFD**. I look forward to their counsel as they help us with the task of getting through the next few months.

We have been doing well in spite of everything — oil spill, clean-up, razing of the Quonset hut and the furnace building. Looking at the silver lining, we will be upgrading our electric service to 200 A, the heating will be via electricity. Now we can concentrate on why we are a club — Amateur Radio.

MEETING MINUTES

SEPTEMBER 6, 2007

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by the president **Louis Mester, W1CH**. The salute to the flag was followed by a roll call. A quorum of 27 members was present. No guests were in attendance.

Secretary's Report (Mike McDonald, KB1NB, acting): Larry Lygren, W1DBX, moved to accept the minutes of the August meeting as presented in September's Zerobeat. Motion passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report (Mike McDonald, KB1NB): Club's financial accounts' balance is \$64,332.40 as of 31 August 2007. NETCOM's September rent received in the non-contract amount of \$2420. A maturing Certificate of Deposit in the amount of \$30,900.08 has been deposited to savings. According to club records last year's chicken barbeque was, essentially a break even proposition at \$5.00 per ticket with 44 tickets sold and expenses of \$217.56. Mike asked that, since his original annual budget of \$50 was expended, that an additional \$30 be authorized. **Armand Augustine, W1BUG**, moved that \$30 be authorized for treasurer expenses. Motion passed unanimously. The cost of security cameras exceeded the authorized amount of \$500 by \$86.96. **Armand Augustine, W1BUG**, moved that the additional amount be approved. Motion passed unanimously. **Armand Augustine's, W1BUG**, motion to refer the report to audit passed unanimously.

Standing Committee Reports

Technical Committee (Dave Goldstein, W1DJG): Security cameras have been purchased. Some noise on the repeater may be due to intermodulation. The new RFID club entry system is operational. Additional RFID card-keys and fobs are on order. Dave thanked **Charlie Days, WA1JFD**, for his donation of a commercial UPS to replace the stolen unit. The membership expressed its appreciation with a round of applause.

Buildings & Grounds (Mike Miller, N1ITQ, [not present]): no report.

Scholarship (Larry Houbre, AA1FS [not present]): no report.

Special Committee Reports

Activities (Scott Szala, W1EV [not present]): no report.

Ares/Skywarn (Rob Macedo, KD1CY): August was fairly quiet. The Red Cross requested help with an upcoming test in October. The event will serve

as the Simulated Emergency Test (SET) for 2007. Currently it is planned for October 27 at 9:00 am. More info will be available at the next meeting. The VoIP hurricane net is going well. December 1 will be SKYWARN recognition day.

Building/Renovation (Dave Dean, K1JGV): Dave recommends installing electric heat to solve the club's heating problem.

QSLs (John Nery, WA1ESO): John reports responding to one QSL in August.

Repeater: Rick Cabral, W1RJC, announced that the node would be returning to the repeater thanks to the donation of ISA sound cards.

Website (Tim Smith, N1TI [not present]): none.

Communications: no report.

Ratification of New Members: No applications received this month.

President's Comments: None.

Old Business: Mike McDonald, KB1NB, reported that the oil spill cleanup is continuing. High readings of contamination under the furnace house require its demolition for the further, necessary excavation. The furnace has been removed to the storage container. An invoice has been received from Frank Corp. for labor and materials through August 1 in the amount of \$24,142.79.

New Business: Armand Augustine, W1BUG, moved to install electric heat in the club at a cost not to exceed \$5000. Motion passed: 23 yeas, 1 nay.

For the Good of the Club: Mike McDonald, KB1NB, reported that a member has set up a container for donations to cover the cost of coffee and donuts but reminds members that purchase with the club's funds is authorized by a motion approved in January.

Elections: Elections were held for the (2) vacant trustee positions and secretary's position. Results:

Trustee: 24 ballots @ 2 votes per ballot; 13 required for election. **Charlie Days, WA1JFD**, 23 votes; **Mike Miller, N1ITQ**, 17 votes; **Chris Smith, K1CJS**, 4 votes. **Charlie Days and Mike Miller elected.**

Secretary: 23 votes cast, 12 required for election. **Rick Cabral, W1RJC**, elected with 23 votes.

Dave Neal's, W2DAN, motion to adjourn passed unanimously at 8:23 p.m.


